

Fr. Jim McIlhone, Director of Biblical Formation for the Archdiocese of Chicago

Fr. Jim McIlhone has been a priest of the Archdiocese of Chicago for nearly 34 years. He entered Quigley Preparatory Seminary South and graduated in 1966, and attended Niles College of Loyola University where he graduated in 1970 with a BA degree in classical Languages in the honors program. He attended St. Mary of the Lake Seminary from 1970 to 1974 where he graduated with a Masters of Divinity and Baccalaureate in Sacred Theology in 1974. He was ordained a priest of the Archdiocese of Chicago on May 8, 1974. In September of 1975, he was awarded the Licentiate in Sacred Theology from St. Mary of the Lake Seminary.

From July of 1974 to July of 1980 he served as associate pastor at Our Lady of the Wayside Parish in Arlington Heights. During this time he began giving talks in the area of Sacred Scripture and wrote articles for *AIM* (Aids in Ministry) and the *Word in the Home*. In August of 1978, he was named an associate member of the Catholic Biblical Association. In July

1980, he became associate pastor at Santa Maria del Popolo in Mundelein. During this time in addition to regular parish duties he pursued his Doctoral Degree in Religious Studies with a major emphasis in New Testament at Marquette University. He also contributed articles to *Chicago Studies*, and the *Bible Today*. He also became a regular contributor to the Homily service *Markings* published by the Thomas More Association. During his years at Santa Maria, he also taught religion at Carmel High School in Mundelein. He offered courses in Spirituality, Prayer, and Scripture.

In January 1987, he was named to the faculty of the University of St. Mary of the Lake/Mundelein Seminary taking up residence in June 1987. In October 1987, he defended his Doctoral dissertation entitled "The Lord Your God is One: An analysis of Mark 12:28-34, the Love command". He graduated with a Ph. D. degree in Religious Studies in December 1987, and the following August was named an active member of the Catholic Biblical Association.

He has taught several courses at Mundelein Seminary in Old Testament, New Testament, Biblical Languages and Intertestamental Literature, and Patristics. He is the author of *The Word Made Clear*. And during his time at Mundelein he has contributed to *Church Magazine* and *Catholic Biblical Quarterly* where he has reviewed biblical software.

Fr. McIlhone served as the Chairman of the Computer Committee of the Catholic Biblical Association and currently is a member of the same committee. He also is a member of the Society of Biblical Literature, The Biblical Archaeological Association, the Chicago Society for Biblical Research, and the Catholic Theological Association of America. He began serving the People of St. Francis de Sales parish in June of 1990 and has been with the parish continuously since that time.


At Mundelein Seminary, he serves as the Chairman of the Department of Biblical Exegesis and Proclamation, as well as Associate Dean of the School of Theology, and Vice President of the Ecclesiastical Faculty. He is a former director of Computer Services for the Seminary, and currently serves as Director of the Summer Scripture Seminar. In May 1995, he was named a Full professor in the Department of Biblical Exegesis and proclamation.

From 1994-2009, he has served as Associate State Chaplain to the Illinois State Council of the Knights of Columbus, in addition to serving as Faithful Friar to the Northern District of Illinois for the Fourth Degree.

He has addressed the presbyterates of several dioceses throughout the country on fundamentalism and several biblical topics. He has presented papers at the Catholic Biblical Association in continuing seminars as well as updating the membership on several occasions on the most recent software advances in biblical studies.

Since 2010, Fr. Jim has been the Director of Biblical Formation for the Archdiocese of Chicago. In this position, he has developed a website, www.wordmadeclear.org which has an electronic commentary on the Gospel of Mark, an electronic commentary on the biblical Roots of the Mass, and currently he is working on an Electronic Commentary on the Gospel of Luke. In addition, Fr. Jim serves as a faculty Member and board member of the Chicago Catholic Scripture School, and a faculty member of the Institute of Diaconal Formation.

Jeremiah's Temple Sermon (Jer 7:1-15 NABRE)

The Temple Sermon.*¹ The word came to Jeremiah from the LORD: ² Stand at the gate of the house of the LORD and proclaim this message there: Hear the word of the LORD, all you of Judah who enter these gates to worship the LORD! ³ Thus says the LORD of hosts, the God of Israel: Reform your ways and your deeds so that I may dwell with you in this place. ⁴ Do not put your trust in these deceptive words: “The temple of the LORD! The temple of the LORD! The temple of the LORD!” ⁵ Only if you thoroughly reform your ways and your deeds; if each of you deals justly with your neighbor; ⁶ if you no longer oppress the alien,* the orphan, and the widow; if you no longer shed innocent blood in this place or follow after other gods to your own harm, ⁷ only then will I let you continue to dwell in this place, in the land I gave your ancestors long ago and forever.

⁸ But look at you! You put your trust in deceptive words to your own loss! ⁹ Do you think you can steal and murder, commit adultery and perjury, sacrifice to Baal, follow other gods that you do not know, ¹⁰ and then come and stand in my presence in this house, which bears my name, and say: “We are safe! We can commit all these abominations again!”? ¹¹ Has this house which bears my name become in your eyes a den of thieves? I have seen it for myself!—oracle of the LORD. ¹² Go to my place at Shiloh,* where I made my name dwell in the beginning. See what I did to it because of the wickedness of my people Israel. ¹³ And now, because you have committed all these deeds—oracle of the LORD—because you did not listen, though I spoke to you untiringly, and because you did not answer, though I called you, ¹⁴ I will do to this house, which bears my name, in which you trust, and to the place which I gave you and your ancestors, exactly what I did to Shiloh. ¹⁵ I will cast you out of my sight, as I cast away all your kindred, all the offspring of Ephraim.¹
